From The Rector

Senior Moment

2034

I recently celebrated my 20th year with the phone company. We moved to Bristol (Abingdon actually) in 1994 when Rachel was two and Jordan was still but a twinkle. (At Emmanuel, George Bunn was rector and had been for 17 years.) I use the word 'celebrated' advisedly. Working for what is now a Fortune 150 company, the celebration is performed a corporate 'acknowledgement.' At a company of nearly 50,000 employees, a cake and pocket watch for each 20th anniversary would make a serious dent in the bottom line. So efficiency dictates a certificate and a gift card. Generous, but a difference from probably how it was done two decades ago when the company's leaders were community stalwarts in Bristol and the phone company was affectionately known as 'United Intermittent.' Still, the company has been very good to me and my family, even while it and I have undergone our mergers, acquisitions and maturing.



Father Joe's presence at Emmanuel over the past almost two months has been one of learning and adjusting for all of us. There has been no need for major changes; instead, it's been a period of gentle negotiation as the parish office, wardens, and new rector have adjusted to the new order, deciding 'who's on first.' Almost immediately upon signing Joe's contract, my professional life found a way to seep into any 'free' time that I might have had with Joe taking charge. It has been a personal/professional balancing act for Joe as he's taken on new responsibilities and at the same time moved his family from Roanoke & Georgia to Bristol. But it's a transition that he has weathered with good humor and pragmatism. During Joe's first worship service with us on Pentecost, I learned the hard way that you can't guess at a former priest's liturgical experience, especially if the deacon is close by. During some unprepared remarks of introduction, I mentioned Joe's previous ordination with the Lutheran church. This was an error (it's actually Methodist); but, in follow-up, Preston 'helped' by whispering 'Baptist' followed by a wry smile; Joe concurred – the same smile - and I repeated it all as fact to the assembled. Lesson – beware the deacon! Shortly after, Joe recommended I read the Spring 2014 'Proceedings of the State LARCUM Committee of Virginia,' and write for him a 1,000-word essay on my understanding of the major differences between Lutherans, Episcopalians [Anglicans], Roman Catholics, and United Methodists. That's some heavy reading. Each has a subtle difference in its interpretation of the bible; how we're saved; how scripture is viewed. In the end, I 'borrowed' the following for a part of my assignment and claimed it was my original work. (It's actual from Garrison Keillor's 'The Young Lutheran's Guide to the Orchestra.') I'd like to think you could substitute Lutheran with Anglican or Baptist or Methodist, but I'm not sure it works - perhaps it's 40 years of how Lutherans have been described in Lake Wobegon,

or our deeply embedded cultural clichés of protestant faiths. (Try convincing a non-Episcopalian that we're not rich Catholic-lites who like to eat and drink.)

'There are two places in the orchestra for a Lutheran, and one is percussion. It's the most Lutheran instrument there is. Percussionists are endlessly patient, because they don't get to play much. Pages and pages of music go by where the violins are sawing away and the winds are tooting and the brass is blasting but the percussionist sits and counts the bars, like a hunter waiting for the quail to appear. A percussionist may have to wait for twenty minutes just to play a few beats, but those beats have to be exact and they have to be passionate and climactic. All that the epistles of Paul say a Christian should be – faithful, waiting, trusting, filled with fervor – are the qualities of the percussionist. The other Lutheran instrument, of course, is the harp. It is the perfect instrument for a Christian because it keeps you humble. You can't gallivant around with a harp. Having one is like living with an elderly parent in poor health – it's hard to get them in and out of cars, impossible to satisfy them. A harp takes fourteen hours to tune and remains in tune for twenty minutes or until somebody opens a door. It's an instrument for a saint. If a harpist could find a good percussionist, they wouldn't need an orchestra at all; they could settle down and make wonderful music, just the two of them.'

As Face Book might ask: What instrument are you? (By the way, he gave me a B- on my paper.)

Think of all the change in our lives these past 20 years; think of all the change in Bristol and its surroundings. Now project forward 20 years to 2034, and imagine what will pass and what is to come: Emmanuel close to celebrating 175 years; baptisms of those not yet born or even imagined; our children turned adult with children of their own; past lives of current parishioners celebrated and remembered on All Saints Day. Beginnings and endings; the anticipations, the unknowns. We welcome Joe, Kathy and Kate to our community – their community – and look forward to sharing current traditions, and starting new ones. The Liturgy we all have in common; others we'll enjoy introducing: Rally Day, Christmas Dinner, Rhythm and Roots. Day 1 of the next 20 years has just started; here's to the next 7300!

Deacon's Word

The Rev. Preston Mitchell



Either Kristie or myself (I can't remember which one of us) named this column *Deacon's Word*, so I thought that I had better actually come up with a word

for the column. Thus the word for the month is **SUMMER**.

Summer has always been my favorite time of the year. As a young boy summer meant no school, swimming with my family, fishing with my buddy Tolbert, playing Little League baseball and staying outside until dark. As an adult it also meant no school, going on vacations with my family, taking my basketball teams to camps, and biking all over the continental United States. It was during the in-between times, I suppose as a teenager then a young adult that I spent nine summers at, Camp Burnt Gin, what was then named the South Carolina Camp for Crippled Children in Wedgefield, South Carolina.

The camp was poor, even in disrepair those first few years. A slimy, warm, alligator infested lake served for boating and swimming. A 6 X 8 foot shed served for arts and crafts. The cabins were dark, dank places that broiled in the summer time heat. But it was the most wonderful place I have ever spent time in. The kids, so many of them never having even been in school (a time before Public Law 94-142 which required schools to educate all

children) were a sundry bunch many with crutches, or wheelchairs. Many were deaf or had an extremity amputated, and there were many other physical anomalies. What they all possessed was a great appreciation and love for the counselors, staff members and each other. It was what the Irish call a "thin" place, a place where heaven and earth come closer. Those summers from 1972-1980 impacted me more than any time in my life. When I was ordained last year, two of those campers now in their fifties attended. Billy Jett, a triple amputee, was one of my presenters. Another of my presenters James Pollard, who was my supervisor at the VA hospital where I did my Clinical Pastoral Education, commented after the service that I had been ordained quite some time ago by those kids at Burnt Gin.

This summer I have had the pleasure of visiting two places that could be considered "thin" places for many, Boys Home and Grace House. My wife Patty and I along with thirty-two others in the Abingdon Convocation spent a day working and visiting with the boys at the home. Lives are certainly changed in this special place of ministry in Covington, Virginia. We also have been to Grace House on the mountain in Sandy Ridge on Sunday evenings. On one of those Sundays, Father Joe, Margaret Kearfoot, Anna Rush, Greg Roberts, and Judy Mitchell joined us and feted a youth group from St. John's in Roanoke who were embarking on a week of work with those in need. My hope is that each of you have a "thin" place where heaven and earth come closer. I encourage you to visit those places where your soul can surely be nourished and can come to know the presence of God.

 2. Turn right onto Commonwealth Ave. Continue to follow Commonwealth Ave/VA-381 N. (go 0.95 miles)
 3. Turn left onto Keys St (the stoplight just as I-381 starts. (go 0.03 miles)
 4. Turn immediately onto Commonwealth Avenue Ext past the chip factory. (go 0.32 miles)
 5. Bear to the right past the trailer park and under the interstate - Elkton Ln / Pittstown Rd / Island Rd. (go 0.56 miles)
 6. Go up the hill (Bobby's Market is on the right) onto Benhams Rd. (go 3.16 miles)
 7. Turn left onto Burson Ln just before Goodson Kinderhook fire dept (go 0.22 miles)
 8. Turn left onto Reedy Creek Rd. (go 0.47 miles)
 9. Take the 1st right onto Rollins Dr (Portions unpaved). (go 0.33 miles)
 10. 19310 ROLLINS DR is on the right. Fern Valley Farm is at the end of Rollins Dr

 - Discernment Update
 - The search committee met with candidate Joe Dunagan and his wife, Kathy, on April 15 and 16. During the Rev. Dunagan's visit, those in attendance shared communion. Following supper, the Vestry met with the candidate for a wide-ranging discussion. The next day, a smaller group of Vestry met with the candidate for breakfast, and the candidate's wife met separately with another Vestry group also for breakfast.

Motion: **Vestry authorizes the Wardens to enter into negotiations to draft a Letter of Agreement with the intent of calling the Rev. Joe Dunagan to be the next rector of Emmanuel Parish. The final letter of Agreement will be approved by the full Vestry at a future meeting called for that purpose: passed by unanimous vote.**
