Again this year I will remember the prayer Dag Hammarskjöld wrote in his journal on New Year's Eve:

*For all that has been, Thanks.  
For all that will be, Yes!*

As I think about the things for which I am thankful, I realize it is not *things* but *relationships* that have made my life happier and fuller in 2015. Never were those relationships accentuated more than when Kathy (my wife) was in a car wreck last summer. I will always remember arriving at the site near the marina where the accident occurred and seeing Kathy in the back of an ambulance. The car was totaled and Kathy spent a couple of days in the hospital but we replaced the car easily enough and Kathy has made a complete recovery. The aftermath of the accident was marked with kindness and support from our Emmanuel family. We are thankful for the Slagles who came to Kathy's aid immediately and took care of our dog, Prancer, who was in the car. We are thankful for Fred

Knickerbocker's calm reassurance during Kathy's recuperation and for all the people who offered prayers, brought food, and visited.

My point is that it is not the things that happen to us but the relationships, including our spiritual family, that are ultimately most important. I have said to a number of you that 2016 is going to be a great year at Emmanuel. It will be if we say yes to God's abundant gifts, starting with the grace to be thankful for all that has been, and to forgive.

Through the red doors representing the atoning blood of Christ, we enter a house of prayer and our spiritual home. Join me in a New Year's resolution to seek a deeper relationships with God and each other. Following the admonition of St. Paul to his spiritual family, the church at Philippi, let us remember the Lord is near and let our gentleness be known to everyone, being kind and careful and calm.

## Formation Ministries

“So, what’s your Good News?” I ask the assembled young people at Sunday school that morning. In the Gospel reading John the Baptist, after ripping into the crowds that came to be

baptized calling them a brood of vipers, tells them essentially “turn from your old ways, and do what you know is right.” The crowd loves it. They were filled, it says, with “expectation.” John the Baptist had proclaimed to them Good News. Surely some of them changed their ways, and made the world around them look just a little more like what God intended.

My question fell silently over the room. “That’s a tough one” I offered, as I reel the question back in. Tough, perhaps, because the answer is different for everyone. There are some answers to be sure that are universal. But even in our Gospel reading John’s advice was unique to the tax collectors and the soldiers. To the blind, it is sight. To the hungry, it is life-giving bread. I think each of us receives our Good News in our own way. And just like the tax collectors and the soldiers, our responses to the Good News are going to be unique.

I’ve been heartened by the passion I’ve seen at Emmanuel for the discipleship of our young people. I see it in talking and visiting with our wonderful catechists in the atria, and the joy the children -including Marshall, my son - take in being a part of it. It shows in the enthusiasm for Sunday School, in parents that prioritize their children’s presence there, and the adults who offer their presence. And it’s no small wonder these followers of Jesus gathered at Emmanuel Episcopal Church are so eager to share, spread, transmit, and translate their faith: the disciples at Emmanuel hold profound Good News, and they are responding!

This reality arrived in special clarity on Christmas Day in the Parish Hall during the annual Christmas Dinner. It arrived in a vignette, as if it had been set by a Hollywood or Broadway director or a Renaissance painter. Already that evening I’d been moved by the significant number of people who entered the bell tower and nave soaking wet, having clearly walked a ways in the persistent rain to get to a welcoming place and a hot meal. Take a moment and imagine what would motivate you to go to such lengths, to arrive in such a state. What deep longing would you sojourn like that to satisfy. We all have one. Anyway, that night, Emmanuel was a beacon, haven, sanctuary, a light shining in the darkness.

The scene was this: singers with beautiful voices at the piano, some with no use for song sheets, blessing the room with their voices; children leaving the library clutching a precious toy; a basketball team from out of town singing the Christmas carols of their fatherland; a new formation director, feet sore from watching, learning, but not being particularly helpful, savoring a hot meal with guests and volunteers; two guests, high school friends now middle-aged parents, facing one another holding hands and encouraging one another through dark winter months.

This is, as close as I can conceive, what heaven is like, what God is working through us to make on Earth: all gathered with their gifts and their wounds, giving gladly of what God’s given them, and receiving Christ’s healing balm from one another.

This is good news (note the lower-case) for me in shepherding youth discipleship at Emmanuel. No one of us - especially myself - holds the whole message. Each one of us is a unique translation of the Gospel, a new response to the Good News. And when the Holy Spirit works to raise up a follower of Jesus, the Spirit does so through the host of saints around that person. My time here at Emmanuel will be spent building the scaffolding around our young people for the Holy Spirit to do the work. My good news is that the Spirit was working long before I arrived, and will continue to work long after I’m gone.

So let’s build something! My first order of business is to form a committee to set the vision of the youth program, tell its success stories, and hold its institutional memory. We’ll set a calendar of events, formational and fun, to foster relationships among youth and the adults. Then we’ll recruit the congregation to take purposeful roles in setting the program in motion. Just like the church, there’s room for everyone. Some are comfortable being chaperones and load-bearing leaders in the program, some have gifts in hosting one-time events or performing specific tasks, while others can fill in behind the scenes.

I can’t close with anything more important than profound thanks to the welcome Emmanuel has given me and my family, and an exclamation of how excited I am to be a part of what the faithful at Emmanuel are doing. Pray for me, please, for our youth and for one another, that our Good News shine boldly as an example to one another.

## Confirmation Preparation

In the Episcopal Church one of the sacramental duties of a bishop is the confirmation of mature Christians. Bishop Bourlakas is scheduled to be at Emmanuel on the Feast of Pentecost, May 15, when he will confirm those who are "ready and have been duly prepared to make a mature public affirmation of their faith."

Those who should consider confirmation preparation include young people who were baptized as infants or who have not been baptized and believe they are now ready to affirm the baptismal covenant and vows made on their behalf as babies or desire to be baptized now. Our Formation Minister is planning confirmation preparation for youth that will be fun, conversational, experiential, and liturgical. Participants will commit to making this a priority for their spring schedules. Holy Week begins on March 20th and will factor heavily into the process. Young people who are interested in intentional preparation for this sacrament should contact John Simpson ([emmanuelforma@gmail.com](mailto:emmanuelforma@gmail.com)) by January 17.

Adults who have not been baptized or who were baptized but have never been confirmed or received as Episcopalians should speak with Father Joe about their preparation for confirmation (or reception into the Episcopal Church). Adults who desire a deeper spiritual life should also speak with Father Joe about preparation for renewal of the Baptismal Covenant.

# Vestry Minutes

The November 16, 2015 Vestry meeting of Emmanuel Episcopal Church was called to order at 5:14 p.m.

Absent: Barbara Sue Kurre

Guests: Sharon Kyser, Tom Rogers, Michael Webb, and Audrey Zaidi.

## Rector's Report

- October attendance averaged 88 people per Sunday.
- Vestry Orientation and Planning meeting will be Saturday, December 5 at Jubilee House Retreat Center in Abingdon from 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. At the close of the meeting, Fr. Joe would like to have
  - An inclusive Calendar for 2016 (Liturgical Feasts and Observances; Events; Stewardship; and Administrative).
  - Revisit Friedman's Reinventing Leadership
  - Ministry Reviews—What's working well? What needs attention?
  - Communication—What do we want to say and how will we say it?
  - Policies and Customaries
  - Possibly elect officers for 2016
- Emmanuel will not be hosting Family Promise the end of December. Fr. Joe is working on partnering with another area church to make our host weeks easier on our ministers from Emmanuel.
- John Simpson, his wife and children have visited the parish a few times. He has given his resignation to St. John's and has acquired a rental property in town. He will begin at Emmanuel December 1. John submitted a report which Fr. Joe distributed and is attached to the minutes. John's first Sunday with us will be Sunday, November 29.
- There will be a luncheon to welcome the Simpsons after the 10:30 Eucharist on Sunday, December 6.
- Denise Rowe will be the role of coordinator for the annual Christmas Dinner.
- Diocesan VPG this year is \$31,971.52 and the commitment form must be into the diocesan office by December 15. A motion was made by Denise Rowe to meet the obligation for the 2016 Diocesan Pledge, second was provided by Doug Mitchell, and was approved by the vestry unanimously.

The Deacon's report is attached to the minutes.

## Wardens' Reports/Remarks

- Senior Warden Report, Denise Rowe
  - Denise Rowe has spoken to several of the young adult group about assisting with the teens.

- A Night of Song was suggested by Audrey Zaidi. This will be a social event for the congregation where everyone can come together to sing familiar hymns.
  - There will be no Supper Club in January and February due to the instability of weather conditions. There is a possibility of a couple of family dinners during those months to encourage fellowship among parishioners.
  - Need assistance with Christmas Dinner
- Junior Warden Report, Jeremy McLaughlin
- Gutters need to be cleaned, possibly repaired/replaced in places, and have gutter guards installed. Motion by Doug Mitchell to approve up to \$2,000 for the gutters. Second by Debbie Tidwell. Motion approved unanimously.
  - The sidewalk is still in need of repair. Jeremy and David Taverner are working on this issue.

## Treasurer's Reports

- The treasurer, Bob Bruce, presented the 2016 Budget. The budget is attached to minutes. Some numbers will change (janitorial, and workers compensation insurance).
- Depreciation will be part of the finance numbers in 2016.
- The 2016 budget has a \$12,000 deficit.
- There are still some expenses outstanding for the Fine Arts Committee, but, there are funds left over that are being carried over to 2016.
- The pledge goal will be \$300,000 for 2016. Despite the fact that we are adding a \$50,000 staff position, the pledge goal has only risen by \$15,000.
- Motion from the finance committee is to adopt this as the budget for 2016. Motion approved unanimously.

## Old Business

- David Taverner thanked the Vestry for the gifts he received in appreciation for his service to the Emmanuel.

## New Business

- Stewardship information will be sent out to parishioners by the end of the week.
- Fr. Joe requested that vestry members volunteer to speak to the congregation during services the next few weekends.
- The December 21 meeting will be cancelled. Items will be covered during the Vestry retreat on Saturday, December 6.
